Environment, 1960-1979 Susanneh Bieber, 2023-07-31 This volume reframes the development of US American avant garde art of the long 1960s from minimal and pop art to land art conceptual art site specific practices and feminist art in the context of contemporary architectural discourses Susanneh Bieber analyzes the work of seven major artists Donald Judd Robert Grosvenor Claes Oldenburg Robert Smithson Lawrence Weiner Gordon Matta Clark and Mary Miss who were closely associated with the formal aesthetic innovations of the period While these individual artists came to represent diverse movements Bieber argues that all of them were attracted to the field of architecture the work of architects engineers preservationists landscape designers and urban planners because they believed these practices more directly shaped the social and material spaces of everyday life This book's contribution to the field of art history is thus twofold First it shows that the avant garde of the long 1960s did not simply develop according to an internal logic of art but also as part of broader sociocultural discourses about buildings and cities Second it exemplifies a methodological synthesis between social art history and poststructural formalism that is foundational to understanding the role of art in the construction of a more just and egalitarian society The book will be of interest to scholars working in art history architecture urbanism and environmental humanism

exercised a transformative influence over the ways in which both art objects and practical designs are produced exhibited encountered and used While primarily known for his three dimensional sculptural work most notably his famed stacks and progressions series Judd began life as a painter Between 1957 and 1963 he produced around eighty works on canvas distinctive explorations of line color and non representational composition that would directly inform the iconic three dimensional objects that followed This fully illustrated volume is the most comprehensive exploration of Judd s painting and early works to date providing unparalleled insight into that pivotal seven year period and tracing his transition from two to three dimensions The book features newly commissioned photography of all of Judd s paintings in addition to his early experiments with wall based sculptures as well as extended essays from three leading art historians Eileen Costello historian of modern and contemporary art discusses Judd s eventual rejection of or transition from the canvas in favor of the sculptural form Sarah K Rich an associate professor of art history at PennState Pennsylvania and director of its Center for Virtual Material Studies deconstructs and analyzes Judd s painterly technique and the resulting works on canvas Lynn Zelevansky historian curator and former Henry J Heinz II Director of the Carnegie Museum of Art Pittsburgh provides an overview of the period and the peers alongside whom Judd was formulating his paintings and early works Donald Judd was born in 1928 in Excelsior Springs Missouri and died in 1994 in New York His work is held in numerous collections including those of the Museum of Modern Art New York Solomon R Guggenheim Museum New York National Gallery of Art Washington DC San Francisco Museum of Modern Art Tate London and Tokyo Metropolitan Art Museum The Museum of Modern Art presented a major retrospective of Judd s work in 2020 21 In 1986 Judd founded the Chinati Foundation La Fundaci n Chinati in Marfa Texas for the permanent installation of his large scale works In 1977 he established the Judd Foundation in New York and Marfa Texas

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web jan 18 1994 jacket description back in all of pinter s plays seemingly ordinary events become charged with profound if elusive meaning haunting pathos and wild comedy in the caretaker a tramp finds lodging in the derelict house of two brothers in the dumbwaiter a pair of gunmen wait for the kill in a decayed lodging house

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web the dumb waiter drama in one act by harold pinter produced in 1959 and published in 1960 it projected the uneasy feeling of comic menace that was prevalent in pinter s early plays the dumb waiter is a two character play set in the basement of an old rooming house connected to the rooms above

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web his first produced play the birthday party came a year later the reception was unfavorable it closed within a week but pinter s next full length play the caretaker 1960 won more accolades the dumb waiter also staged in 1960 helped cement pinter s status as a major theatrical figure

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web they investigate and find a box on a dumb waiter a small elevator used for conveying food and dishes between stories of a building gus pulls a piece of paper out and reads out an order for food the dumb waiter ascends

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
